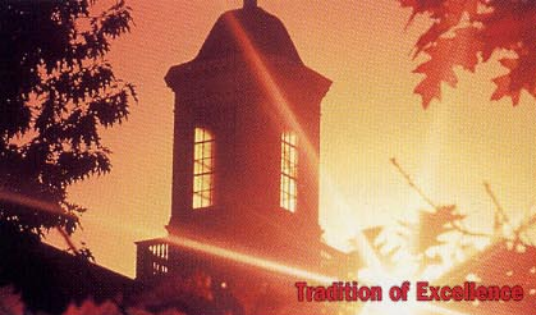

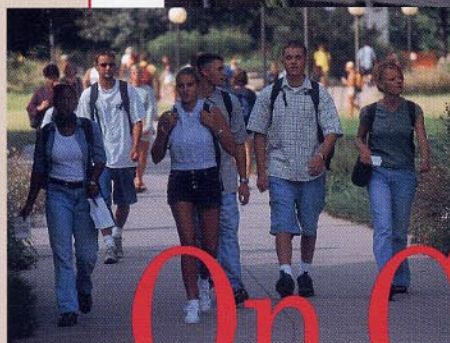

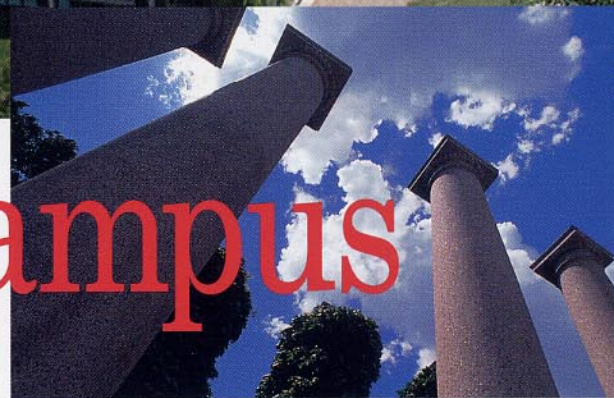

AP, CLEP & IB

Nebraska awards credit in several subject areas for strong scores on the Advanced Placement (AP) and College Level Examination Program (CLEP) tests. NU also cooperates with the International Baccalaureate Program in its curriculum and examinations program.

COMPUTERS & INTERNET

Computer labs equipped with both Macintoshes and PCs are located in many classroom buildings, most Greek houses and all residence halls. Plus, each residence hall offers high-speed Internet access in every room, and free University email accounts are available to all students.

DOUBLE MAJORS

For a vast majority of major combinations, you will be able to double major at Nebraska. Students are admitted to the University with one major. After you arrive on campus and have spoken with an adviser, it is possible to declare a second major.

HONORS PROGRAMS

Nebraska Honors, currently the largest program of its kind in the Big 12, includes a renewable textbook scholarship.

The highly selective J.D. Edwards Honors program is America's leader in computer science and management education.

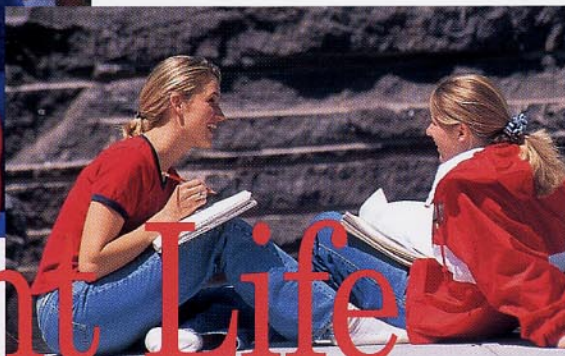

ADMISSIONS STANDARDS

These requirements apply to all high school graduates since January 1997. For high school graduates prior to 1997, requirements are listed at admissions.unl.edu/reqs_before.html

4 units of mathematics, must include Algebra I and II, geometry and one additional unit that builds on a knowledge of algebra or geometry.

4 units of English. All units must include intensive reading and writing experience.

3 units of social studies, including at least 1 unit of American and/or world history and 1 additional unit of history, American government, and/or geography.

3 units of natural sciences, including at least 2 units selected from biology, chemistry, physics, or earth sciences. One of the units must include laboratory instruction.

2 units of one foreign language, the second must build on the first.

Students who need one or more of these courses should check options for meeting these requirements at admissions.unl.edu/reqs_after.html

PERFORMANCE REQUIREMENTS

In addition to these core course requirements, freshman applicants should have an ACT of 20 or higher, or an SAT of 950 or higher, or rank in the top half of their graduating class.

COSTS

Costs for the 2003-04 school year are:

Resident tuition:	\$128.25/credit hour
Nonresident tuition:	\$381.00/credit hour
Fees:	\$992.00/year

Annual costs are based on a single, undergraduate student taking 15 credit hours per semester for two semesters and living in a residence hall in a double room with 19 meals a week during 2003-04:

SCHOLARSHIPS

To be considered for most University scholarships, you must apply for admission by **Jan. 15, 2004**.

- New freshman scholarships range from \$1,000 non-renewable to the full cost of attendance.

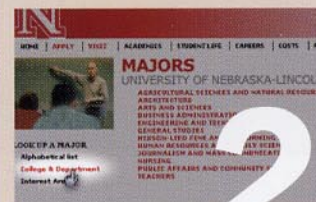

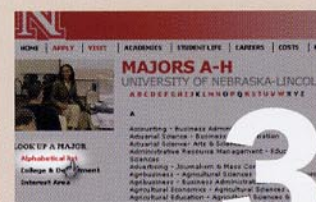
